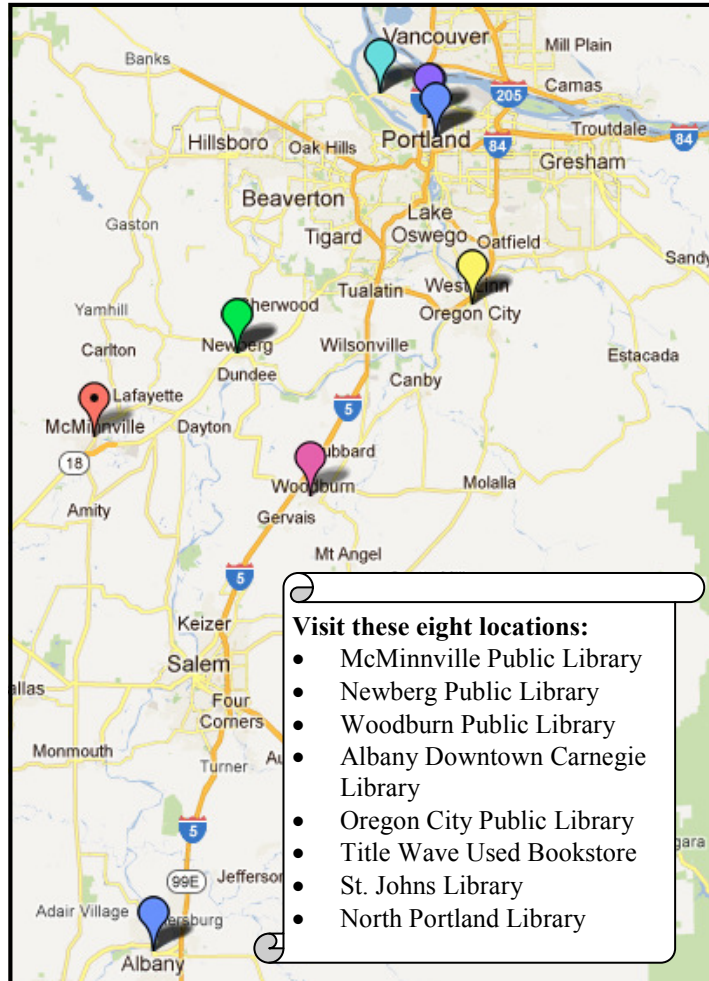
Official passport



The McMinnville Public Library is celebrating its 100th birthday in 2012, and this passport is part of the centennial celebration. Did you know that in the early 1900s the Carnegie Corporation of New York helped fund the building of 31 public libraries across Oregon? The McMinnville Public Library was built with money from one of those grants.

Between January 2012 and January 2013, McMinnville Library Patrons are encouraged to visit all eight of the Carnegie Libraries featured in this passport. Have each library stamp their featured page and page 21, and then turn in page 21 to the McMinnville Public Library in order to enter a drawing for a fabulous grand prize.

The Title Wave Used Bookstore is located in the former Albina Carnegie Library. It was built in 1912 in the Spanish Renaissance Revival Style. Did you know that Albina was once a separate city from Portland? Albina was consolidated into Portland in 1891. While you are visiting consider buying a book because sales support the Multnomah Public Library.



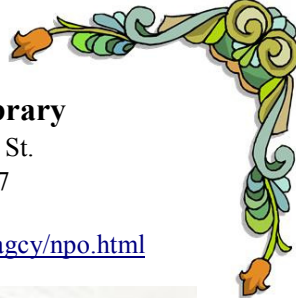

The St. Johns Library building was built in the Southern Colonial style with funds from the Carnegie Corporation. The Library opened in 1913 and was extensively renovated in 2000. Did you know that the St. Johns was named after a settler named James Johns? According to the story he was called “Saint” Johns because he was rather withdrawn.

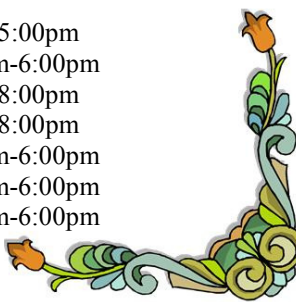

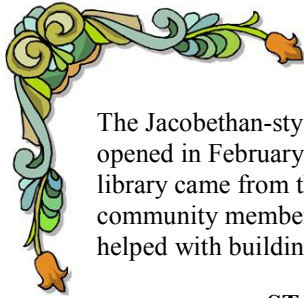

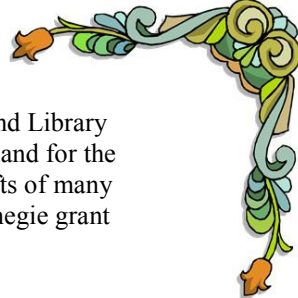

Worldwide Andrew Carnegie awarded grants to over 2,500 public and university libraries between 1883 and 1929. In the United States 1,689 Carnegie Libraries were built. In Oregon, 31 public libraries were built from Carnegie grants and one academic library was built at Pacific University in Forest Grove.

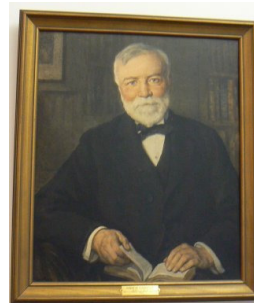
